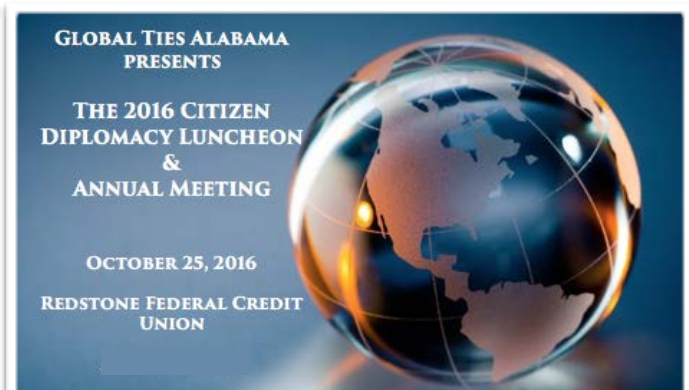

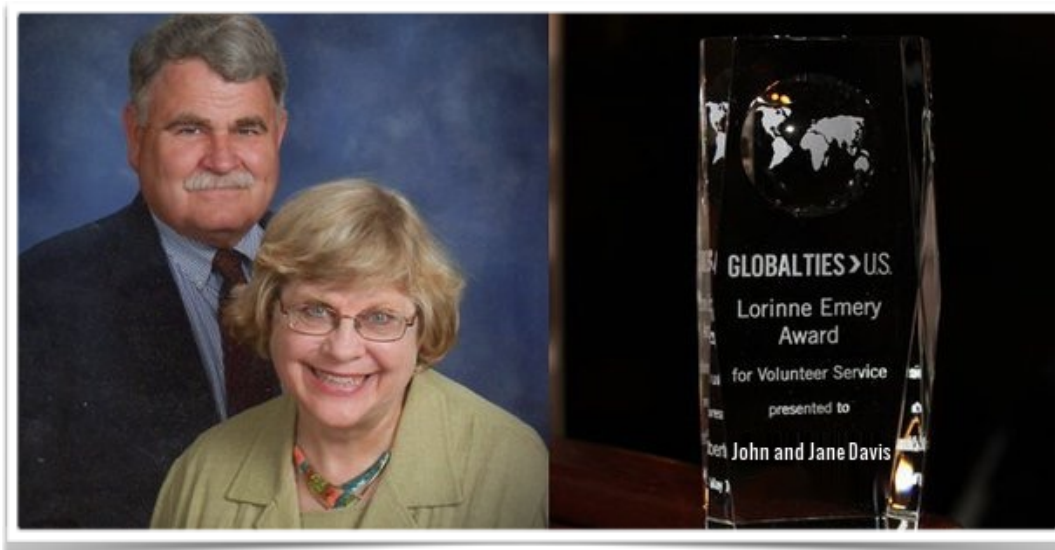

JAPANESE CONSUL GENERAL SPACE AND ROCKET CENTER

On May 19, Global Ties Alabama was pleased to host the honorable Consul General of Japan in Atlanta, Takashi “Thomas” Shinozuka. Consul General Shinozuka was in Huntsville for the annual dinner hosted by the Japan-America Society of Alabama (JASA).

JASA, a private nonprofit, seeks to strengthen ties between Japan and the United States by fostering friendships between American citizens and Japanese nationals based in Alabama. It is one of 38 organizations across the U.S. that have the same goal.

Strong ties already exist between Japan and the state of Alabama. Many Japanese companies do business in the state. “In Alabama, we have some 144 Japanese-affiliated companies, some 5,000 Japanese expatriates and 80,000 workers in these Japanese companies,” Consul General Shinozuka said.

These companies include Honda and Toyota, both of which have plants in Lincoln (Talladega County) and Huntsville (Madison County) respectively. Because of the high volume of Japanese companies doing business in Alabama, Consul General Shinozuka estimated that Japan is either the highest or second-highest foreign investor nation in the state. “The Japanese people are happy to live here,” he said. “I think that our companies also are happy to operate here.”

Consul General Shinozuka assumed his post in January. It is his first time representing the Japanese people in the U.S. His jurisdiction includes Alabama, Georgia and the Carolinas.

His prior positions in the Japanese government include serving as the Vice Grand Master of the Ceremonies in the Imperial Household Agency and director-level posts in the Cabinet Office, the National Institute for Research Advancement (NIRA), and the Economic Affairs Bureau of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. He also has represented Japan in France and Myanmar.

During his visit to Huntsville, the Consul General also visited the world-renown U.S. Space and Rocket Center. Jim Fransen was his tour guide for the exhibits.

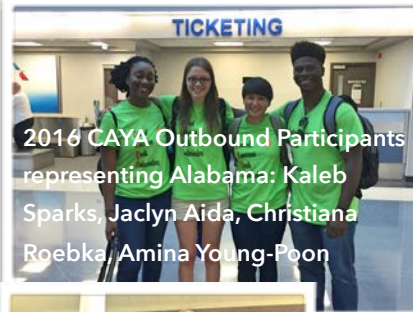

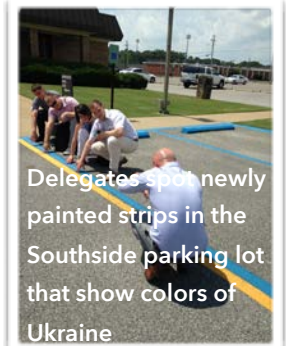
